COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to art making with the computer. Through demonstrations, practical exercises and a series of extended projects, the student will explore the computer both as an imaginative research tool and as a viewing platform. The student will explore cultural diversity through the computer interface, situate computer imagery as a distinct and unique means of expression and will interpret a personal world view through digital art projects. Through directed critiques and discussions, the student will compare established forms of art with works in digital media and will situate the products of the digital representation in the tradition of cultural objects from here and elsewhere.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

Students will produce developmental work before realizing individual computer artworks. The student will create artworks on and with the computer and when appropriate produce permanent copies of the works using the printers in the computer lab or other appropriate means. Exercises and projects: see weekly schedule.

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TEACHING METHODS

Introductory lectures and verbal presentation of assignments; practical demonstrations of techniques; slide and video presentations; occasional field trip/gallery visits; group and individual critiques in class.

GRADE DISTRIBUTION – A minimum grade of 60% is required to pass this course.

60% - Class work and home assignments

30% - Summative Assessment

10% – Organization, participation, and professional conduct

- Summative Assessment: Specific projects, stated in advance, contain a summative assessment mark. In order to pass the course, the students must obtain an overall minimum 60% in this summative assessment category.
- Organization, participation, and professional conduct include applied problem-solving, organization, self-motivation, self-discipline, and consideration and respect for others and for the studio.
- The student will keep a course visual journal book for class notes, thumbnail sketches, experiments and class exercises related to specific art and design principles.
- Assignments will be evaluated on presentation, use of tools and materials, problem solving, and understanding of visual principles
 presented.
- Students will hand in all sketches and research materials with their projects.
- Students are expected to come to class with the necessary materials, even if absent from the previous class.
- End-of-semester pick-up of student work and projects: Students are required to pick up their marked work at a date specified by the instructor. After this date, the department is not responsible for the storing of student work.

GRADING POLICY FOR LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Project deadlines (date and time) MUST BE RESPECTED. During the term late submissions will carry penalties, however, the FINAL ASSIGNMENT / TEST must be handed in by the deadline to be considered for grading.

Penalties for late assignments

If the project is late due to sickness, then a medical note must be handed in to reduce or waive the penalty. Evaluation of all assignments, tests and presentations requires that students MUST be available in class for teacher feedback.

ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION POLICY

Presence and participation are necessary components of learning. Students who fail to attend or participate may jeopardize their successful completion of the course.

Attendance will be taken in every class. <u>Arriving late or leaving early is considered an absence.</u> After two absences, the instructor will notify the student and the department of his/her precarious state in the course. Three absences represent a loss of 20% of class time and course work. It is at the instructor's discretion to require documentation for absences. **Note: When absent from class, the student is responsible for inquiring about missed information and assigned homework.** Students should refer to the Institutional Student Evaluation Policy (Section IV-C) regarding attendance.

LITERACY POLICY

The 10% professional attitude mark will include an assessment of the student's ability to discuss and criticize his or her work within the large context of art and its traditions.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY POLICY

Authorship of submitted work, in part or in whole, must not be misrepresented. If it is suspected that the work submitted is the result of the un-acknowledged use of source material or involvement in any dishonest or deceptive practice, the student may be required, at the teacher's discretion, to provide proof of authorship in the form of preliminary work. The same assignment may not be submitted to multiple courses unless approved by all the



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respective teachers. Any student who submits work where cheating or plagiarism is suspected will be reported to the office of the Dean of Creative & Applied Arts in accordance with ISEP Section V-C.

STUDENT CONDUCT

POLICY ON RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCES

If a student is attending an intensive course, the student must inform the teacher within the first two weeks of class of the specific dates of any anticipated absences.

PORTFOLIOS

From their first term in the program, students should keep all their work and creative projects in a portfolio. This will be useful for the Integrating Activity course and for university admission.

TENTATIVE WEEKLY SCHEDULE

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Class 1 Aug.22	Introduction to course: outline and list of materials. Accessing <i>Adobe Photoshop</i> program, basic exercises.
Class 2 Aug.29	Working with programs, entering and exiting files, portable memory. Opening new image (size, resolution, mode, background), drawing, painting tools, color) Begin Project 1: Drawing and painting
Class 3 Sept. 12	Type tool, transformation, move tool, layers (copy and order), gradations, history. Work on Project 1.
Class 4 Sept. 19	Project 1 due Selection tools (feather, adding and subtracting selections); folders, saving work to folders and drop box.
Class 5 Sept. 26	Presenting project 2 (summative assessment – 30%): Working with photos Filters, layer modes, layer styles, blending options.
Class 6 Oct. 3	Printing: page set-up, choosing printer, printing
Class 7 Oct. 10	Project 2 due Introduction to Animation
Class 8 Oct. 17	Project 3: Animation Introduction to scanning: settings, selection and saving. Adjustment and manipulation of digital photographs: Orientation controls, levels, curves and contrasts.
Class 9 Oct. 24	Creating image: effective use of selection tools (geometrical selection tools, lasso, magic wand, feather, Adding and subtracting selections), of transformation (scale, distort, rotate). Copying and pasting layers and selections.
Class 10 Oct. 31	Continuation
Class 11 Nov. 7	Image manipulation using filters, adjustment layers, layer transparency and layer modes. Project 3 due, in-class critique.
Class 12 Nov. 14	Introduction to project 4
Class 13 Nov. 21	Project 4: continuation
Class 14 Nov. 28	Project 4due at the end of class
Class 15 Dec. 5	Critique
